

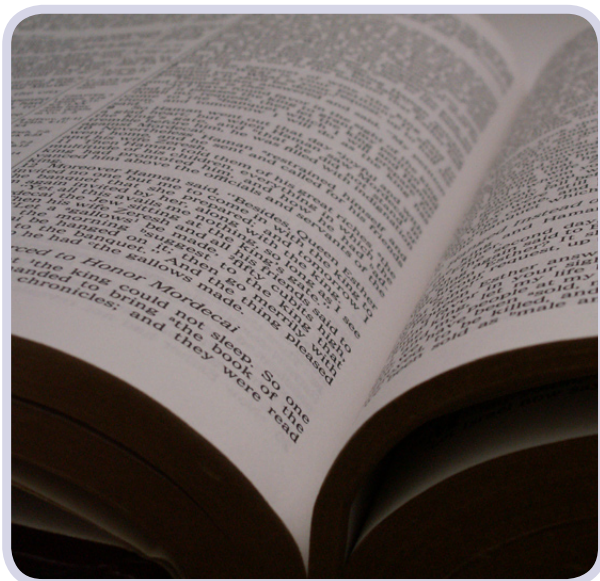

CHRISTMAS

According to the people who study such things, the word Christmas originates from the Old English or Dutch. Political correctness aside, it is by any investigation a celebration of a people's faith. Christmas, a compound word, separates into two parts. The first is 'Christ' and the second is 'mas'. Few would be surprised that the word 'Christ' is from the Latin 'Christus', and before that, from the Greek 'Khristos'. Every christian congregation would believe that the beginning of the Messiah's work is evident in the New Testament biblical account. It is found in the book of Luke, chapter two, where a supernatural messenger announced to some poor folks watching sheep, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

While the entire teaching of any faith is impossible to summarize, we can accept the witness of one who wrote that he was there to see the Messiah celebrated by Christmas. A man named John wrote in a letter, "Let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God. This is love: not that we loved God, but that He loved us.
